

In Case of First Amendment Emergency

If asked for customer information by a police officer, FBI agent or other law enforcement personnel, say "I need to talk to my attorney" and then *call* **ABFFE**.

If handed a subpoena for customer information, *call* **ABFFE**.

If presented with a search warrant for customer information, say "I need time to consult with my attorney" and then *call* **ABFFE**.

(The police do not have to let you contact your attorney. If they insist on searching right away, you must let them or you could be arrested. After the police leave, call ABFFE.)

If an FBI agent shows you a court order for records pursuant to Section 50 USC 1861 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, ask to speak to your lawyer first, then *call* **ABFFE**.

(Recipients of FISA orders under Section 50 USC 1861 are forbidden to reveal their contents to anyone other than people who are needed to help produce the records. However, you may contact ABFFE without saying why you are calling and ask for a legal referral.)
